Pupils found both the session and the college tour informative and fun. An exciting peek at what life after CCSC may look like for some of our Geographers.

Pupils started by learning memory techniques that can be used for revision - or for remembering the last 5 countries to host the World Cup! They had to look for team news, stats, any recent meetings between the teams and quotes from managers and players of Newcastle Town FC



REVISION How To Revise/Recap



- 1. Summarise**
 - Read a topic/chapter/page and summarise into 5 bullet points.
- 2. 5 Questions**
 - Read the topic/chapter/page and write your own 5 questions with answers.



- 3. Definitions**
 - Pick 5 keywords and write the meaning.
- 4. Picture**
 - Draw a diagram/picture and label it to explain what it shows




- 5. Video**
 - Watch a SHORT video on YouTube on a topic/keyword/concept and pause it at appropriate times to make 5 bullet points.



- 6. Quiz**
 - Find 10 questions on kahoot, booklet or educake, answer them and make notes on anything you learn or need to remember.



- 7. Mind Map**
 - Pick a topic and draw a mind map explaining 10 key points.



- 8. Copy**
 - Pick a topic and read the crucial knowledge.
Copy 5 sentences that you don't remember or understand.

- 9. Memory**
 - Look at the crucial knowledge for 30 seconds. Cover it up and write down everything you can remember in 30 seconds. Repeat 3 times.



- 10. Flash Card**
 - Pick a topic/chapter/page and on the front of the flash card write 5 keywords/phrases or pictures and on the back write what they mean.

11. Exam Questions/Past Papers

- Pick a topic and answer exam questions. Ensure you use a mark scheme to check your answers. Past Papers can be found online and downloaded.

12. Worksheets/Workbooks

- Pick a topic and complete a placemat or worksheet on that topic. Ask your teacher and they will print/send you lots. Use your memory first and then use other resources such as the crucial knowledge to help you.





Astro Rules



Scientists discuss legal rights for aliens

Should we take extraterrestrials seriously? As space technology improves, some scientists are demanding we form a consensus on alien rights. Others caution against expecting little green men to arrive any time soon.

"It wasn't a man or an animal — it was something different," recalled Katia Andrade, one of three women who claimed to have encountered an extraterrestrial creature in a small town in Brazil.

The creature was oily, rubbery, had brown skin and three antler-like protrusions from its head. It stank **nauseatingly**. And, according to the women, it appeared to be in excruciating pain.

The incident took place more than two decades ago now, but has plummeted back into public consciousness due to a new documentary released this year. It is among a series of sightings which scientists are scrutinising closely amid a global debate on alien ethics.

The Brazil "alien" is a key sighting. If such an alien existed and was suffering, this would prove its **sentience** — that it could feel pain and pleasure just as humans can. According to animal

Stephen Hawking and Avi Loeb have expressed their opinions that Earth is not the only part of the universe to sustain life. But many experts caution against making predictions based on little evidence.

According to Professor John Zarenecki, "finding life or making contact is always going to be highly unlikely until we do it". An alien encounter could happen at any given time, and there is no such thing as being over-prepared.

Others argue that we should take extraterrestrial creatures seriously, but that our approach should be far more cautious. Astronomer Seth Shostak warns that if **marauding** aliens make contact with earth, we would be better off hiding, because their technology would likely be worlds better than our own.

Aliens have long captivated the public and creative consciousness. In both 1982's *E.T* and 2016's *Arrival*, for example, protagonists relate to alien intruders who reflect their own feelings of being an outsider.

Mike Chen categorises these stories as "fear of the other" narratives, which "hold up a mirror to our society, demonstrating that systemic aggression often overlooks compassion and

ethicist Peter Singer, this means that we would be morally obliged to balance its needs against ours — "in other words, the pain of an extraterrestrial counts as much as the pain of an Earthling".

Discussions about legal and ethical rights for aliens are by no means easy. International authorities rarely have open conversations about the possibility of extraterrestrial life, let alone how we can protect it.¹

Some experts are arguing we should shatter this **taboo**. Space technology is coming on in leaps and bounds. Consensus on our moral approach to undiscovered fellow lifeforms is crucial.

Others counter that such conversations would be premature. There is by no means scientific proof, or even clear agreement, about extraterrestrial species. High-profile scientists such as

understanding". And even if no aliens ever materialise, serious reflection on our approach to the vastness of the universe could help us to learn far more about ourselves.

Should we take extraterrestrials seriously?

Spacing out

Yes: There is no way of telling if or when aliens will arrive, but it is fair to assume that it will happen one day. We need to be prepared for the eventuality, so that we do not let fear overcome our strong ethical values.

No: We want aliens to exist because it helps us to feel less alone in this universe. But the idea that another intelligent lifeform could help us understanding the meaning of our lives is nothing but fanciful thinking.


Or... Even if we never make contact with any other lifeforms in the universe, developing a unified consensus on how to deal with alien ethics could help us to understand our own sense of ethics.






9. The 'criss-cross' force trick!

A very easy, but impressive trick to predict the spectators playing card!

Here's how it is done:

- First, you will need a pack or 'deck' of playing cards.
- (a) the forced card is on the top of the deck (numbered 1 in diagram below).
- (b) The spectator cuts (splits in half) the deck of cards.
- (c & d) The magician puts the bottom pile on the top of the top one in a cross shape.
- (e) The magician removes the top pile and tells the spectator to take "his or her card" by pointing at the forced card.
- (f) The spectator ends up with the forced card which he or she believes to be the other card, selected by the cut.

World Aids Day 1/12/23

Is celebrated every year on the 1st December. The theme for 2023 is **Let Communities Lead** recognising that leadership by those affected is key to making progress in the fight against HIV.

There were approximately 39 million people across the globe with HIV in 2022. Of these, 37.5 million were adults, and 1.5 million were children (<15 years old). In addition, 53% were women and girls. Certain regions of the globe are disproportionately affected by HIV. In 2022, there were 20.8 million people with HIV in eastern and southern Africa, 4.8 million in western and central Africa, 6.5 million in Asia and the Pacific, and 2.3 million in Western and Central Europe and North America.

HIV is a virus spread by sexual contact or by exchanging bodily fluids such as blood. This can happen when people share needles when taking drugs. In the past some people were affected by being given infected blood during blood transfusions. HIV initially causes flu-like symptoms for a few weeks. Usually, the person doesn't then experience any symptoms for several years. During this time, HIV can be controlled with antiretroviral drugs. (If it's presence has been confirmed by testing). These stop the virus replicating in the body.

(GCSE AQA Combined Science Revision Guide).



Unidentified and thus untreated the virus attacks the immune system. If the body's immune system is badly damaged, it can't cope with other infections, or cancers. At this stage, the virus is known as late stage HIV infection or AIDS.

Without the right treatment and care, a woman living with HIV can pass HIV on to her baby. This is called mother-to-child transmission (MTCT) or vertical transmission. Taking anti-HIV drugs can dramatically reduce the risk of a mother passing on HIV to her baby.
