Our School Rules

There are three straightforward rules to follow in school: Be Prepared Follow Instructions Be the Best You Can Be The rules are an integral part of the behaviour system and are linked to rewards and sanctions.

Your child will be awarded an Event Log for good work, good behaviour and positive contribution to school. All of these contribute to the school house system in the form of house points.

Your child will be rewarded with vouchers that can be used towards school trips and events or used at places like The Potteries Shopping Centre after they have accumulated a set amount of Event Logs. Your child will be given Conduct Logs for poor behaviour, disruption of learning, lack of work, punctuality, uniform issues and lack of equipment. This will result in house points being deducted, and with an accumulated amount, will place them on the reporting system.



Key Information For Pupils

Some of the main questions that every pupil starting a new school asks are:

What do I need to bring? Here are the requirements:

RETHE BEST YOU CAN BE

Essentials: iPad fully charged, Black pen x 2, HB pencil, ruler, apron for technology and a school bag (for example a rucksack – you will need to carry books/iPad).
Desirables: Eraser, pencil sharpener, colouring pencils and highlighters.

ParentPay is used at our school: all food purchased will be taken from your ParentPay account (see attached information). A packed lunch can be brought into school if preferred.



Water is available from a dispenser in the canteen to re-fill bottles. Please do not bring fizzy drinks or energy drinks into school.

On the first day, you will not need to bring your PE kit.

Where do I need to go on the first day? At 8:20 am, you will need to go to the main hall.



Parents can drop you off either at the bottom of the drive or walk you to the entrance of school if you're feeling nervous. You will be met by your form teacher and have a brief welcome assembly before going off to your form room to make sure you are prepared for the day ahead. In your form room, you will be given a chance to find out where your classrooms are so that you can relax and not worry about getting lost. Your form teacher will go through school rules, times and your timetable.

Mobile Phones

... are not permitted in school and the school will not take responsibility for the loss or damage of electronic items. If a mobile phone is brought into school, it should be handed into the main office for safekeeping and collected at the end of the day. If there is an urgent need to contact home, this must be done through the main office.

Contact with School: Parent Portal



In a few weeks you will receive login details for the Parent Portal (iSAMS Parent); please take the time to sign up as this is a way of monitoring your child's progress.

The Parent Portal provides up-to-the-minute information on your child's attendance, progress and behaviour awards. You can also use this portal to update your contact details.

ppointments

You will need to make an appointment through the main office if you wish to speak to your child's form teacher, subject teacher or year leader. This is important in order for us to be able to deal with the issue arising and have the correct information to hand.

Contact with Parents/Carers

If there are issues arising during the school day, school will contact you directly. Please ensure that all contact details are up-to-date, especially mobile numbers (this can be done through the Parent Portal). Central messages will be delivered to your phone via the school text system. We also update our Facebook page regularly.

The School Day

Breakfast Club is available every school morning. You are able to buy breakfast cereals, including porridge, toast, hot drinks and daily specials that include some of the following: cheese on toast, oatcakes or bacon baps. This will also operate through ParentPay.

The register is taken at 8.30am and form teachers are ready to greet their form from 8.20am. You will be given a Conduct Log if you are late to school, unless there is a good reason for you arriving late.

Three late marks will lead to a half-hour detention on a Wednesday night. Parents will be notified via the school text message system.

During form time, there will be a rota of activities such as PSCHE, reading silently in form (you can either bring in your own book from home or a book from the school library or use our online Sora library on the iPads), discuss the 'Thought of the Week', uniform and equipment checks, notices from around school i.e. sporting events, room changes and school assemblies.

Your form group will use the initials of your form teacher and you will be part of a house system that is used for competitions, attendance and sports days.

In addition to these form time activities, you will also discuss key topics such as: Bullying, Health, Community and Culture. This is called P.S.C.H.E (Personal, Social, Citizenship, Health Education).

Knowledge-Based Curriculum

iPads and Teams

We are very lucky at CCSC as every pupil gets to have an iPad whilst at school. iPads are each pupil's responsibility. Please ensure that your child looks after their iPad.

Pupils will be expected to have their iPad fully charged each day. Pupils will be expected to follow the normal school rules and behaviour policies when using their iPads, both in school and at home.

As with all other learning platforms and online activities, parents and carers should <u>monitor their child's use of their iPads and Teams</u> to ensure that they are being used appropriately.

We have comprehensive filters and safety measures in place to keep children safe online when they are in school. Please continue to <u>monitor</u> <u>their online activity at home</u> to ensure that they are using their iPads safely.





Microsoft Teams is an online platform which allows teachers to share learning in a controlled environment. Teams has a number of uses and benefits:

- Pupils have full access to online versions of Word, PowerPoint, Excel and Outlook, which they can use to learn from home (part of our existing Office 365 platform)
- Teachers can upload and save files/resources which pupils can access in school and at home
- Teachers can set classwork and home learning tasks
- Each pupil has their own Class Notebook for each subject which they can access and update both in school and at home





iPads and Teams



Crucial Knowledge Learning

Your child's subject teachers will set a range of crucial knowledge quizzes each week in Assignments (Microsoft Teams) and Educake. The aim is to develop pupils' understanding and long-term memory, supporting their learning and developing their overall progress.

Pupils will be expected to complete all set quizzes.

Teachers will set quizzes and return marked work to pupils during school hours and after school. If your child is not using their iPad, <u>it is advisable that they switch off their iPad or Teams notifications</u> to avoid being disturbed.



Attendance


Good attendance is a crucial part of high school. It is important that your child attends each and every day of school to avoid the anxiety that missed work can create. Your child will be expected to catch up with any missed work upon their return to school.

The school target for attendance is 96%. If your child falls below 94%, this will become a cause for concern.

If you know that your child is going to be away from school, please notify their form teacher or the main school office so that this can be marked on the register in advance.

All holidays must be processed and authorised by the Headteacher. Please avoid holidays in term time. Authorisation of holidays will not be given to pupils in Key Stage 4 unless there are special circumstances.

If you child is ill or absent for any unplanned reason, please ring the office in the morning to inform them. This will then ensure that they do not have to contact you.





The House System Pupils are placed in a 'house' and this is indicated by their school tie. House points are added together throughout the year and winners are announced regularly.

The School Canteen

At break time, it is advisable to bring a snack to eat or you may purchase one from the canteen. Snacks can be eaten inside and outside the building.

At lunchtime, the canteen is open and serves a range of hot and cold food options. 'Grab and Go' food can also be purchased from the outside kiosk.

There is one queue for the canteen which moves very quickly as there are four areas with a variety of options. Options include:

> Panini, hot/cold baguettes and sandwiches Jacket potatoes, salad bar pots, hot meals Meal deal = Main meal and sweet

All payments will operate through 'ParentPay'. Packed lunches can be eaten outside, in the canteen or in designated rooms. We ask that pupils eat responsibly and use the bins provided for waste.



Uniform



- Black blazer with school badge (required item does not have to be branded from the school uniform shop a badge can be purchased and sewn on). This should be worn at all times and can be taken off in lessons *only* if a member of staff allows it (for example, in hot weather).
- White shirt (required item): It should be noted that this is a traditional shirt that buttons to the collar and is long enough to be tucked in *(shirts should be tucked in at all times)*.
- A plain, black jumper (no logos) can be worn under the blazer (optional item).
- School house tie (required item).
- Black trousers (not branded): Girls should note that the trousers must be of a formal, tailored style, i.e. *not fitted trousers, jeans or leggings.* We should not be able to see ankles! Tight fitting, Lycra trousers will not be allowed at all. Black socks are preferred.
- Skirts : Girls are allowed to wear a school skirt with a school logo (branded), which can be purchased from the school shop. They can choose between skirt or the formal trousers.
- Black footwear (low-heel, no coloured logos, no additional colours on laces or soles). Footwear can be trainers as long as they are all black. (required)
- Jewellery: For safety and security reasons, only one pair of sleeper or stud earrings may be worn in each earlobe. Pupils may wear a watch.
- In all cases, jewellery should be removed if required for safety reasons (PE, Technology).
- No nose studs.
- Hair should be of a natural colour. Pupils who do present themselves with a different colour hair (and go against policy) will have to wear hair up and will be monitored on a daily basis until it grows out.
- Eyelashes need to be natural (pupils will be asked to remove fake ones).
- Nail varnish and false nails are not allowed (for health and safety reasons).
- An apron is required for Technology.

Our Rewards System

"Be the Best You Can Be"

Reward 1 - Earn 25 event logs to receive a voucher at the end of half term.

Reward 2 – Zero Conduct Logs! If you get NO conduct logs in a week (Sunday to Sunday), you will get entered into a lucky dip. A prize for one person, per year group, per week will be announced in Monday's newsletter.

Reward 3 – For every WEEK you receive ZERO conduct logs you get 1 ticket for entry into a lucky dip prize draw. 1 prize for each year group! At the end of each half term ALL tickets are entered into a BIG lucky dip prize draw for a bigger prize, again 1 prize per year!

Music Lessons

Lessons are given during three sessions spread over the school year, coinciding with the school terms. Pupils will receive an average of 10 lessons per session, depending on the length of the term, with a minimum of 30 lessons per year. Extra lessons above this minimum will not be charged. The charge for lessons will be £30 per term for a single instrument. Lessons on a second instrument, will be charged at the lower rate of £25 per term. The cost of lessons is very heavily subsidised by the school and therefore it is expected that when students reach the required standard, they regularly attend at least one extra-curricular group.



Lessons are normally 20 minutes long and are shared with another pupil of a similar standard. Occasionally, this is not possible and a pupil may have individual lessons for a short time. If you require your child to have a guaranteed individual lesson time, this may be available at an extra charge. Lessons will take place during the school day and will be timetabled on a rotation system so that the same curriculum lesson is not missed each week. It is the responsibility of the student to catch up with any work missed.

If your child does not own an instrument, it is possible to borrow one from Staffordshire Music Service (Entrust). This will be arranged through the individual instrumental tutors.

It must be understood that lessons alone do not guarantee good progress and that regular practice is essential. We ask that parents/carers encourage pupils to adhere to the practice regime recommended by their instrumental tutor. Lessons may be cancelled if a child shows an obvious lack of commitment, and therefore progress, so that they may be offered to another pupil on the waiting list.

Once a pupil has enrolled for lessons, it will be assumed that he/she will continue throughout his/her time at Chesterton. To enable us to use our time effectively and keep the cost of lessons as low as possible, we ask that you give half a term's written notice if, for any reason, you wish to discontinue your child's lessons.



Support Systems in School

The school is caring and inclusive. Teachers and support staff work closely with different groups of pupils at different times in their school life whatever their ability.

Pupils with Special Educational Needs are offered support, depending on their individual needs. All of our SEN pupils are effectively supported and leave with the GCSE qualifications they need for post-16 progression.

We offer a wide range of out-of-hours provision, whether it be academic classes, intervention sessions, music groups or sports events. We hope this will support your child in the years to come.
