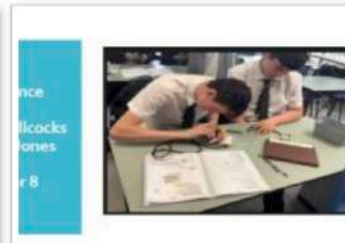
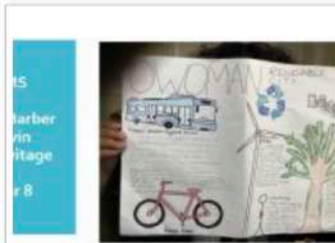

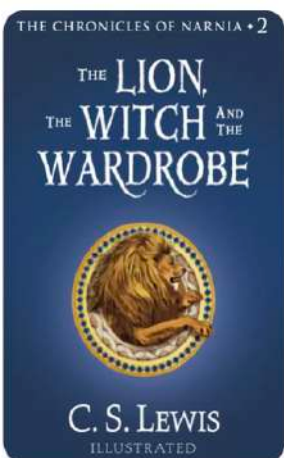

Cacti fact file

History

very little is known about early cactus plants because only two cactus fossils have ever been found. The oldest, found in Utah, dates to 50 million years ago. The first cactus was said to have existed around 35-30 million years ago.



Facts

Cacti can live from 25 to 300 years depending on their species. cactus roots can grow up to 7 feet in diameter. There are almost 2000 different types of cacti. Cactus originates from the Greek name kaktos. Kaktos is a Spanish artichoke or the "prickly plant of Sicily" as many refer to it in Greece.



How to care for one

- Cacti need lots of sun so try to place them in brighter areas.
- You can water your cacti either every 2-3 weeks or once a month just keep in mind to not water them for a while.
- To check if your cacti need watering put your finger in the soil, if it is cold and/or wet, don't water.
- When your cacti do need watering, give them a lot of water.
- try to provide good air circulation.
- keep in mind rot is an instant killer so keep an eye out.
- do some of your own research, different sites say different things.

Newcastle-under-Lyme in the Second World War (1939-45)



Frederick William Kite (5.1.1921-June 1993)

Was born in Newcastle and at the age of 17 (the year before war broke out) joined the Royal Tank Regiment. He saw action in Egypt, Crete, Greece and France and was the only member of the British Army to be awarded the Military Medal three times in World War 2. He died in 1993 at the age of 72 and his service to our country is commemorated in a memorial in the Queens Gardens near Hassell Street School- where he went to Junior School.



The Chesterton Bombing Raid- December 1940

Newcastle was very lucky during the war and only suffered rare bomb damage. However, in December 1940 a lone German plane dropped bombs in the John Street/Sandford Street area of Chesterton. Fourteen civilians died and scores of people were injured. The following summer a raid targeting Shelton Iron & Steel Works dropped a bomb in Taylor Avenue, May Bank. A plaque outside the Forum in Chesterton High Street reminds us of the loss of lives in the Chesterton raid.



The Gloucester Meteor

Most local people know that R.J. Mitchell, the designer of the Spitfire, has a connection with Stoke on Trent (born in Kidsgrove and attended Hanley High School). Far fewer know that the Rolls-Royce Derwent engines for the Gloucester Meteor (the only allied jet aircraft to achieve combat operations during World War 2) were made in the Borough during 1944.



Biodiversity is the variety of different species of organisms on Earth, or within an ecosystem (the interaction of living organism (biotic) with the non-living (abiotic) parts of their environment).

The different organisms are classified according to a system first proposed in the 1700's (known as the **Linnaean system**) which divides living things into **kingdoms**. The kingdoms are **subdivided** into smaller and smaller groups- **phylum, class, order, family, genus, species**.

As knowledge of the various organisms increased scientists put forward **new** models of classification. In 1990, Carl Woese proposed the **three-domain system** which first split all organism into **three large groups** called **domains**:

ARCHAEA- Organisms in this domain were once thought to be **primitive bacteria**, but they are actually a different type of **prokaryotic cell**. They were first found in **extreme places** such as hot springs and salt lakes.

BACTERIA- This domain contains **true bacteria** like E. coli and Staphylococcus. Although they often look similar to Archaea, there are lots of **biochemical differences** between them.

EUKARYOTA- This domain includes a **broad range** of organisms including **fungi, plants, animals and protists**.

These are then **subdivided** into smaller groups- kingdom, phylum, class, order, family, genus and species.
