- Increasing Number of Cores - A Core is a complete copy of a CPU. The more cores the more instructions that can be carried out at the same time.
- Increasing Clock Speed - Clock Speed is measured in Hertz. It means the number of cycles per second. If you increase clock speed it can fetch - decode - execute faster in the same amount of time.
- Increasing Cache Size - Cache Size is temporary storage of data and instructions being read to and written to RAM. It's quicker to collect data from cache because it takes much more time to take it from RAM. Increasing the size means more instructions can be stored in cache but doesn't necessarily make it much faster as it will take more time to find an instruction in a larger cache.

THERE ARE FEW PARANORMAL TALES MORE CAPTIVATING THAN THAT OF BORLEY RECTORY, AND STILL TO THIS DAY, NOBODY KNOWS THE TRUTH SURROUNDING THE MYSTERIOUS HOUSE THAT BURNED TO THE GROUND. APPARENTLY UNDER SUSPICIOUS CIRCUMSTANCES IN FEBRUARY 1939. THE HOUSE NO LONGER EXISTS, AND NO TRACES REMAIN, BUT THE TINY HAMLET OF BORLEY ON THE ESSEX AND SUFFOLK BORDER STILL ATTRACTS HUNDREDS OF HOPEFUL GHOST HUNTERS EVERY YEAR, ALL HOPING TO CATCH A GLIMPSE OF THE GHOSTLY NUN, WHO IS REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN REGULARLY SEEN BY LOCALS AND RESIDENTS OF THE RECTORY DURING THE RECTORY'S FAIRLY SHORT LIFE.

BORLEY RECTORY WAS BUILT IN 1862 AND SHOULD HAVE BEEN AN ORDINARY VICTORIAN CLERGYMAN'S HOUSE. HOWEVER, JUST A YEAR AFTER ITS CONSTRUCTION, UNEXPLAINED FOOTSTEPS WERE HEARD WITHIN THE HOUSE, AND FROM 1900 UNTIL IT BURNED DOWN IN 1939 NUMEROUS PARANORMAL PHENOMENA, INCLUDING PHANTOM COACHES AND SHATTERING WINDOWS, WERE OBSERVED. IN 1929 THE HOUSE WAS INVESTIGATED BY THE "DAILY MAIL" AND PARANORMAL RESEARCHER HARRY PRICE, AND IT WAS HE WHO CALLED IT 'THE MOST HAUNTED HOUSE IN ENGLAND'. PRICE ALSO TOOK OUT A LEASE OF THE RECTORY FROM 1937 TO 1938, RECRUITING FORTY-EIGHT 'OFFICIAL OBSERVERS' TO MONITOR OCCURENCES. AFTER HIS DEATH IN 1948, THE WATER WAS MUDDIED BY CLAIMS THAT PRICE'S FINDINGS WERE NOT GENUINE PARANORMAL ACTIVITY, AND EVER SINCE THERE HAS BEEN A DEBATE OVER WHAT REALLY WENT ON AT BORLEY RECTORY. MANY BELIEVE THE BURNING DOWN OF THE RECTORY WAS DELIBERATE ARSON ON THE PART OF THE THEN OWNER, CAPTAIN WE GREGSON, WHO HAD INSURED THE HOUSE THREE MONTHS EARLIER. MANY BELIEVED HE BURNED DOWN THE RECTORY AND HOPED TO GET AWAY WITH FRAUD BY BLAMING THE "GHOSTS." GHOST HUNTERS (THEN) AND NOW BELIEVED HIM. THE INSURANCE PEOPLE DIDN'T.

'Noughts and Crosses' by Malorie Blackman.

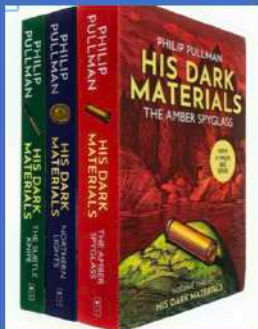
The first of a series of young adult novels. A fiction describing an alternative history. The Novels take place in an alternative 21st-century Britain. Majority of the series is available on the Sora app.

Mrs Thompson's Recommendation

A recommendation for readers of all ages. I didn't think this would be my 'cup of tea' but I loved it! Even though I read it a while ago it still remains in my Top 10. The first book, Northern Lights, set in Oxford one of my favourite UK cities, is still very vivid in my mind and lorek Byrnison, the giant armored polar bear, remains my favourite character. I was disappointed with the 2007 film adaptation (The Golden Compass) but the recent BBC Drama is amazing. The first 2 series are available on iPlayer, series 3 is due to air at the end of 2022. Copies of all the books are available from the School Library and on Sora.

Summary of 'His Dark Materials'

This thrilling trilogy takes place across a multiverse, moving between many parallel worlds. 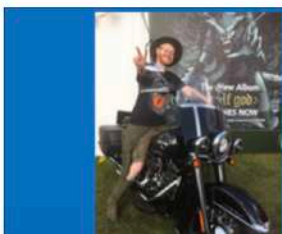

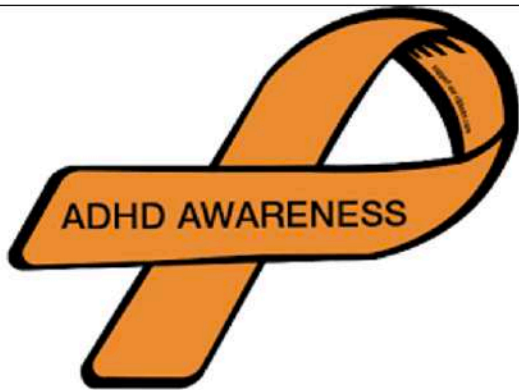

ADHD

Week 3. How common is ADHD?

ADHD is a neurodevelopmental condition; that is to say, its symptoms, and associated behaviours and traits are the result of a person's brain developing differently during the key stages of development before they were born or as a very young child. **This differs from mental illness,** which refers to patterns of behaviour where a person experiences a 'state of mind' that is different from their 'normal self'. **The goal of ADHD treatment is to ensure that people with ADHD can reach their full potential.**

It is becoming increasingly recognised that, along with ADHD, a person may experience symptoms of other neurodevelopmental conditions such as autism, Asperger's, Tourette's syndrome, Obsessive Compulsive Disorder (OCD), dyslexia, and dyspraxia.

Approximately 1 in 2 people with ADHD have dyslexia
 Approximately 1 in 2 people with ADHD have dyspraxia
 9 in 10 people with Tourette's have ADHD
 2 in 3 people with ADHD have autistic spectrum traits, and people with ADHD are 8-fold more likely to meet full criteria for an autistic spectrum diagnosis

It is thought that up to 15% of the population are thought to be neurodiverse.

~8% of people in the UK are thought to have ADHD.
 ~10% of people in the UK are thought to have dyslexia.
 ~8% of people in the UK are thought to have dyspraxia.
 ~6% of people in the UK are thought to have dyscalculia.

Festivals of Light (Defeating Darkness)

Since Neolithic times, man has gravitated toward fire, especially during the dark days of winter with celebrations such as those at Durrington Walls, near Stonehenge. Even today it seems a universal truth that in the dark days of winter, nothing is more welcome than a celebration. These include:

Diwali- Hinduism Sikhism Jainism	On a new moon night in late autumn Diwali (which falls between mid-October and mid-November), sees celebrants shop, feast, clean their homes, dress in their finest and light fireworks. Diwali is celebrated by Sikhs and Jains as well as Hindus. For each religion Diwali also relates to an event in the life of an important religious figure (Religious Leader, Preacher and Deity, respectively).
Yule- Pagan	Yule is a festival historically observed by the Germanic peoples. Scholars have connected the original celebrations of Yule to the Wild Hunt, the god Odin, and the pagan Anglo-Saxon Mǫðraniht. Later departing from its pagan roots, Yule underwent Christianised reformulation, resulting in the term Christmaside
Imbolc- Pagan	The pagan festival known as Imbolc marks the halfway point between the winter solstice and the spring equinox – typically around 4 February – and encourages the rejuvenation of the land and the return of the sun. Fire festivals take place in locations throughout Wales, Ireland, Scotland and England, including the town of Huddersfield
Up Helly Aa- Roots in Paganism	A festival held in Shetland usually on the last Tuesday night of January to mark the end of the yule season. It's an ancient festival of fire that began to be celebrated in Shetland again in the 1880's and more recently has incorporated a "heritage/commercial/fun/tourist opportunity" salute to the Vikings who colonised this part of Europe in the 8th century. This part of Scotland remained a Norwegian province until 1472.

The list above is not a complete list and serves only to illustrate how alongside festivals such as Diwali, light and or fire are and have been used to celebrate religious and cultural festivals in the UK. There are many more similar "winter" celebrations around the world in a variety of cultures and religions.
