Women Heroes of World War II-

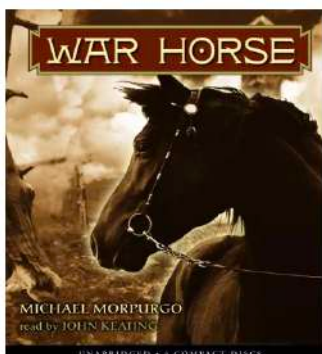
Organized by country, this historical exploration includes stories of girls and women from across Europe and the United States who risked their lives to perform extremely dangerous acts against the Nazis during World War II.

What are my Options?

Apprenticeship

An apprenticeship is where you work, study and earn a wage. They are a popular option and as a result, very competitive. Entry requirements vary considerably but most companies will at least be looking at your Maths and English results. Apprenticeships are available in a wide range of subjects and in certain areas you can even study right up to degree level

Traineeship

A traineeship is an opportunity for you to learn on the job at a high-quality work placement. You'll also develop the wider skills that you will need in the workplace by completing work preparation training. It can be a stepping stone to an apprenticeship or employment which can last anywhere between 6 weeks to 1 year, but in most cases lasts for less than 6 months. It's a good option if you aren't quite ready for an apprenticeship and don't feel like a college course is right for you.

A Levels

A Levels are a popular choice and many people take this route if they want to progress to University. Usually you need to pass at least 5 GCSE subjects at grade 4 or above including English Language and Maths. Often you will need a higher GCSE grade in the subject that you wish to study at A Level. Most students choose 3 subjects to study over the 2 year course, but higher achieving students can choose four.

Please note: A Levels tend to be assessed mainly by exams so you need to be confident with revision and able to cope with exam pressure.

GCSE Resits

If you're worried that you might just miss out on the grades you need then you might want to consider resits as an option. This one year course enables you to select several GCSE subjects to retake. Check with the college to find out how many subjects you can choose and which subjects are available. Usually this route is for students who are very close to passing, for example if you get a grade 3 but you need a grade 4.

BTEC / Vocational Courses

Vocational courses come in a wide range of levels, suitable for people of all abilities, so regardless of your GCSE grades you should be able to find a course for you. Taking this route can also lead to University level study. For more about levels check out the infographic on page 12. Vocational courses relate to specific areas of work, rather than academic subjects. In many vocational courses, you will build a portfolio of evidence and be given regular assignments (coursework) rather than exams. You may have some exams but usually this makes up a smaller proportion of your final grade.

Study Programmes

You may not have heard of study programmes before, but they are certainly a great option to consider. With study programmes you will gain a recognised qualification (for example, a BTEC or vocational course) alongside a substantial work placement. Typically you will also gain additional soft skills alongside your main qualifications such as communication. You may be eligible to receive a bursary, which is basically money to help you while you're studying.

T Levels

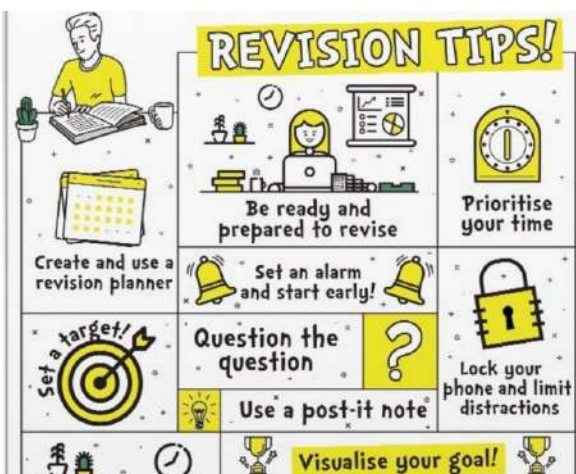
T levels are a new type of qualification aimed at specific career paths. They are good if you've got a rough idea of the kind of work you want to go into. The introduction of T levels began in September 2020 and will continue until September 2023. They last two years in length and are equivalent to 3 A-levels. T levels include a technical qualification (TQ), a work placement for at least 45 days plus maths and English if you didn't gain this at school.

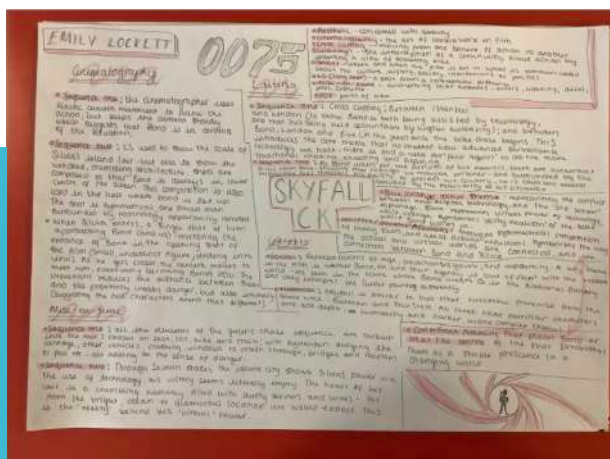
