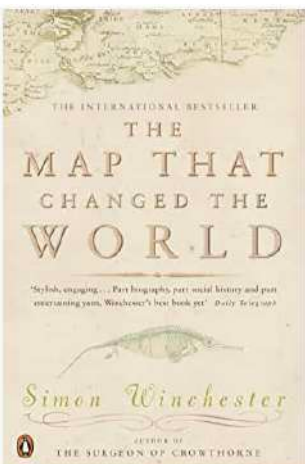


## Science Book of the Week

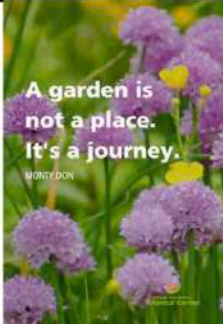
### GARDEN CLUB

**WORLD OCEANS DAY 2022**

**8 June 2022 Theme- Revitalisation; Action for change.**

**THE OPEN OCEANS ARE THE WORLDS LARGEST ECOSYSTEMS.**

An ecosystem is the interaction of a community of living organisms (biotic) with the non-living (abiotic) parts of their environment.

Action is needed to:

- Prevent overfishing
- Stop pollution
- Reduce Global Warming
- Protect habitats and marine life.

More than 70 percent of the Earth is covered by water. When viewed from space astronauts have described it as a blue planet.

Although they make up only 10% of the ocean, the shallow waters of coastal seas are home to 90% of all marine species. Here sunlight reaches the sea floor and plants can grow. These provide food for animals, protection from predators and a safe place for animals to breed and raise their young.

The coastal seas are made up of many different ecosystems including coral reefs, river estuaries, rock pools, salt marshes, mangrove forests and fields of underwater sea grasses.

Beyond the beaches and shallow coastal waters lie the high seas, which cover more than 60% of our planet's surface. This is by far the largest habitat on earth, but also one of the least understood. Over three billion people depend on marine and coastal biodiversity for their livelihoods.

An expanse of seemingly empty ocean may contain much more life than it appears to the naked eye. Phytoplankton are microscopic algae which drift on the ocean currents and support the food chain of the open ocean.

Phytoplankton also produce half of the oxygen in the air that we breathe. Oceans absorb about 30% of carbon dioxide produced by humans, buffering the impacts of global warming.

**World Day against child labour. 13 June 2022**



Economic hardship exacts a toll on millions of families worldwide – and in some places, it comes at the price of a child's safety. Roughly **160 million children** were subjected to child labour at the beginning of 2020.

This accounts for nearly 1 in 10 children worldwide. Almost half of them are in hazardous work that directly endangers their health and moral development.

Children may be driven into work for various reasons. Most often, child labour occurs when families face financial challenges or uncertainty – whether due to poverty, sudden illness of a caregiver, or job loss of a primary wage earner.

The consequences are staggering. Child labour can result in extreme bodily and mental harm, and even death. It can lead to slavery and sexual or economic exploitation. And in nearly every case, it cuts children off from schooling and health care, restricting their fundamental rights and threatening their futures

**Historically in the UK**

While children had always helped alongside their families at home or in their family's fields and gardens, in the 1800s it became common to employ children in factories. Conditions for children were appalling and often dangerous but eventually there were key changes in the law that improved conditions for children.

**1819 Factory Act:** This banned factories from employing children under nine years of age and set a maximum of 12 hours work a day for nine- to 16-year-olds.

**1833 Factory Act:** This banned children of any age working before 5:30am or after 8:30pm, introduced an hour-long lunch break, made education a right for all children and introduced a factory inspection system to check that the conditions were being improved.

**1901 Factory Act:** This banned factories employing children under 12 years of age and made further rules around safety equipment. For example, all factories required fire exits

In the UK, the rest of Western Europe and North America industrialisation initially increased the demand for child labour but this declined sharply in the 20<sup>th</sup> century as laws first controlled and later prohibited their use and introduced the statutory provision of education.

Currently in the UK children under 16 are not legally allowed to work in a full-time position, but they are able to work for a limited number of hours from the age of 13.

**In modern times worldwide**

While the number of children in child labour has declined by 94 million since 2000, the rate of reduction slowed by two-thirds in recent years.

Africa ranks highest among regions both in the percentage of children in child labour – one-fifth – and the absolute number of children in child labour – 72 million. Asia and the Pacific ranks second highest in both these measures – 7% of all children and 62 million in absolute terms are in child labour in this region.

The Africa, Asia and the Pacific regions together account for almost nine out of every ten children in child labour worldwide. The remaining child labour population is divided among the Americas (11 million), Europe and Central Asia (6 million), and the Arab States (1 million). In terms of incidence, 5% of children are in child labour in the Americas, 4% in Europe and Central Asia, and 3% in the Arab States.

The agriculture sector accounts for 70% of children in child labour, followed by 20% in services and 10% in industry.

But for teenagers, in particular: the right type of work at the right age and for a limited time per day, can teach valuable life lessons.
