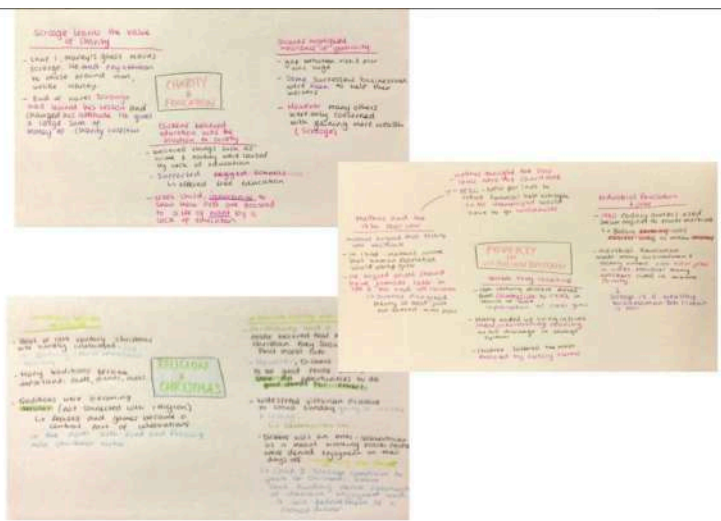

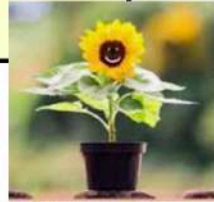
THIS WEEK – MEET IN THE WORKSHOP

What is Remembrance Day?

- Armistice Day is on 11 November and is also known as Remembrance Day.
- It marks the day World War One ended, at 11am on the 11th day of the 11th month, in 1918.
- A two-minute silence is held at 11am to remember the people who have died in wars.
- Remembrance Sunday is also marked each year, this falls on the second Sunday in November.



Why is Remembrance Day Important?

- In summary, it is all about memory.
- During World War One there were around 20 million deaths and 21 million wounded in both the armed forces and civilian communities.
- Therefore, Remembrance Day is a day to honour and remember their lives and sacrifices. This can be done through wearing poppies, going to Remembrance ceremonies or reading and listening to the experiences of those who fought.

The kind old sun will know.

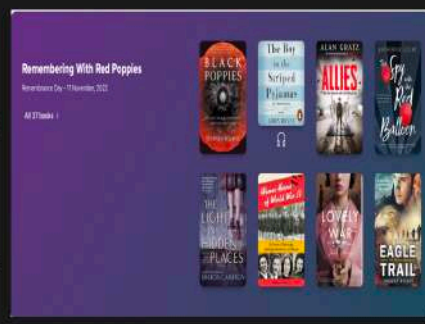
Think how it wakes the seeds—

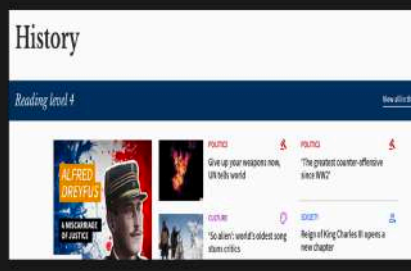

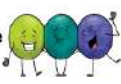
